**NOT VALID WITHOUT THIS CODE. You may use a headcollar/ halter and leadrope, neck rope or work at liberty**

**BUT REMEMBER you must keep your lead rope loose (if used) and keep moving forward between obstacles with no**

**circling. If you do have a tight lead rope, stop or circle BETWEEN obstacles you will lose a mark from the next**

**obstacle's score.**

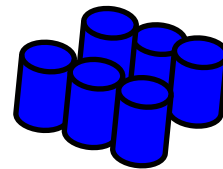
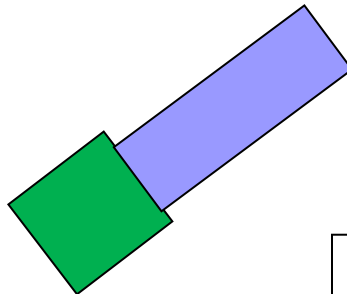
**2. Umbrella.** Pick up an open or closed umbrella and carry it at least 3m (10ft) as you lead your horse then put it down.



**3. Raised pole** at horse's fetlock height off the ground. Horse to walk over without touching.



**4. Narrow tarpaulin.** Fold your tarpaulin so that it is no more than 2ft 6in (75cm) wide and at least one horse length long. Horse to walk over from end to end without stepping off the side. Do not use poles to mark the edge of the tarpaulin. Handler can be anywhere.



**START**

**5. Mat.** Not more than 1m x 1m (3ft 3in x 3ft 3in) in size. This is placed at the end of the tarpaulin with no gaps. Horse to halt on mat with front feet for a count of one before continuing, The horse's back feet must be on the tarpaulin during the halt.



**1. Narrow Gap.** Create a narrow gap which is 1m/3ft wide, at least one horse length long and at least as high as your horse's elbow. The sides should be **solid down to the ground so that we can not see horse's legs or feet as they go through.** Horse walks through while handler goes around the outside.

**FINISH**

**6. Touch cone.** Halt at a cone or other marker and ask your horse to lower his head easily and smoothly to touch it. You **MAY NOT** place food on the cone or lure the horse with food towards it.
